

C. Bruce Allen & Architectural Museum
formerly in Cannon Row, Westminster

1851 Established by a group of architects led by George Gilbert Scott for the purpose of improving the education of architectural art-workers. Its collections primarily consisted of plaster casts of European Gothic architectural ornament, original examples of decorative ironwork, tiles, woodcarving, sculptural stonework, stained glass and architectural models, plans and drawings. Became the Royal Architectural Museum.

1857 Moved to the new South Kensington Museum (now the Victoria and Albert Museum).

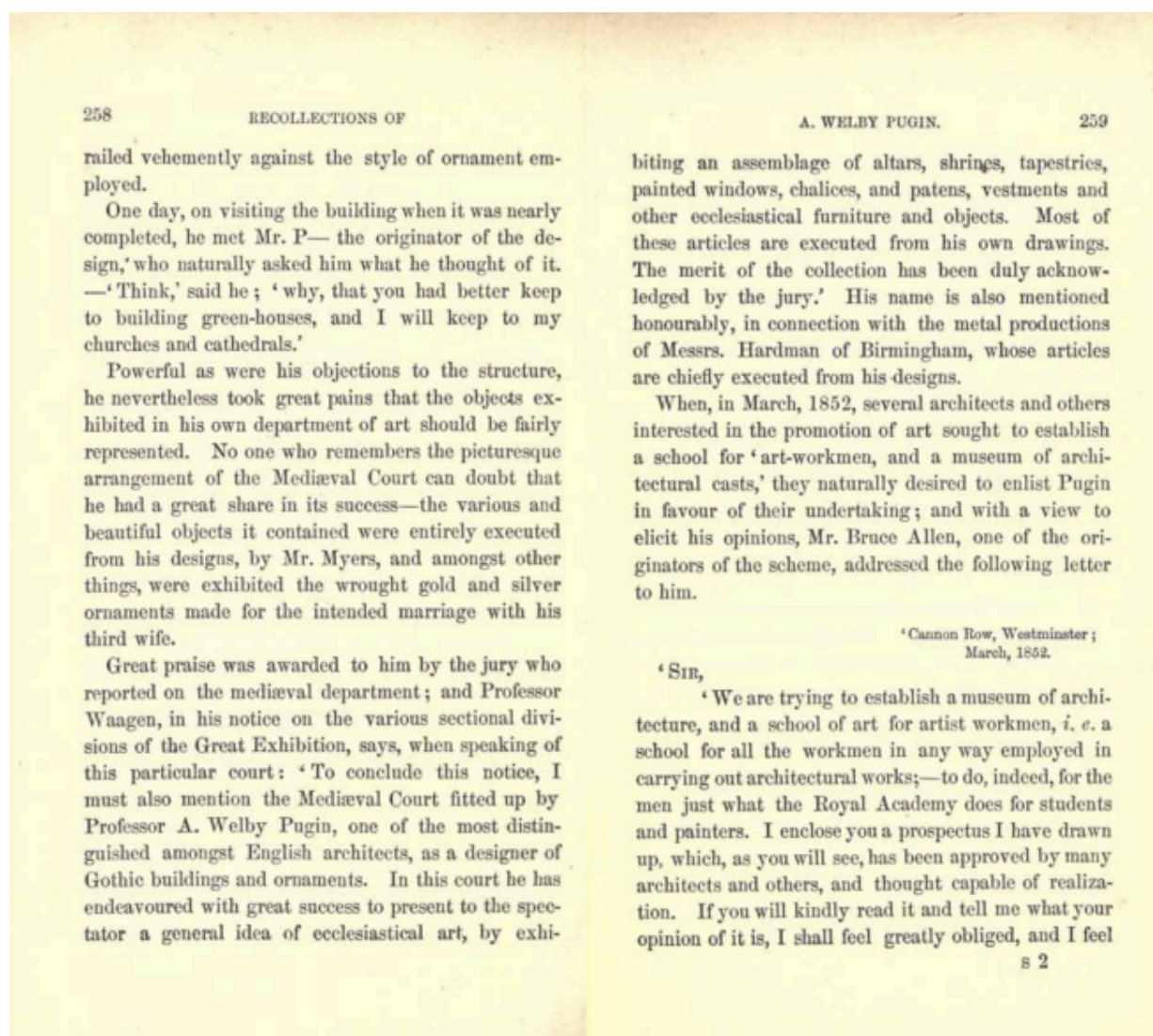
1869 Moved to Tufton Street.

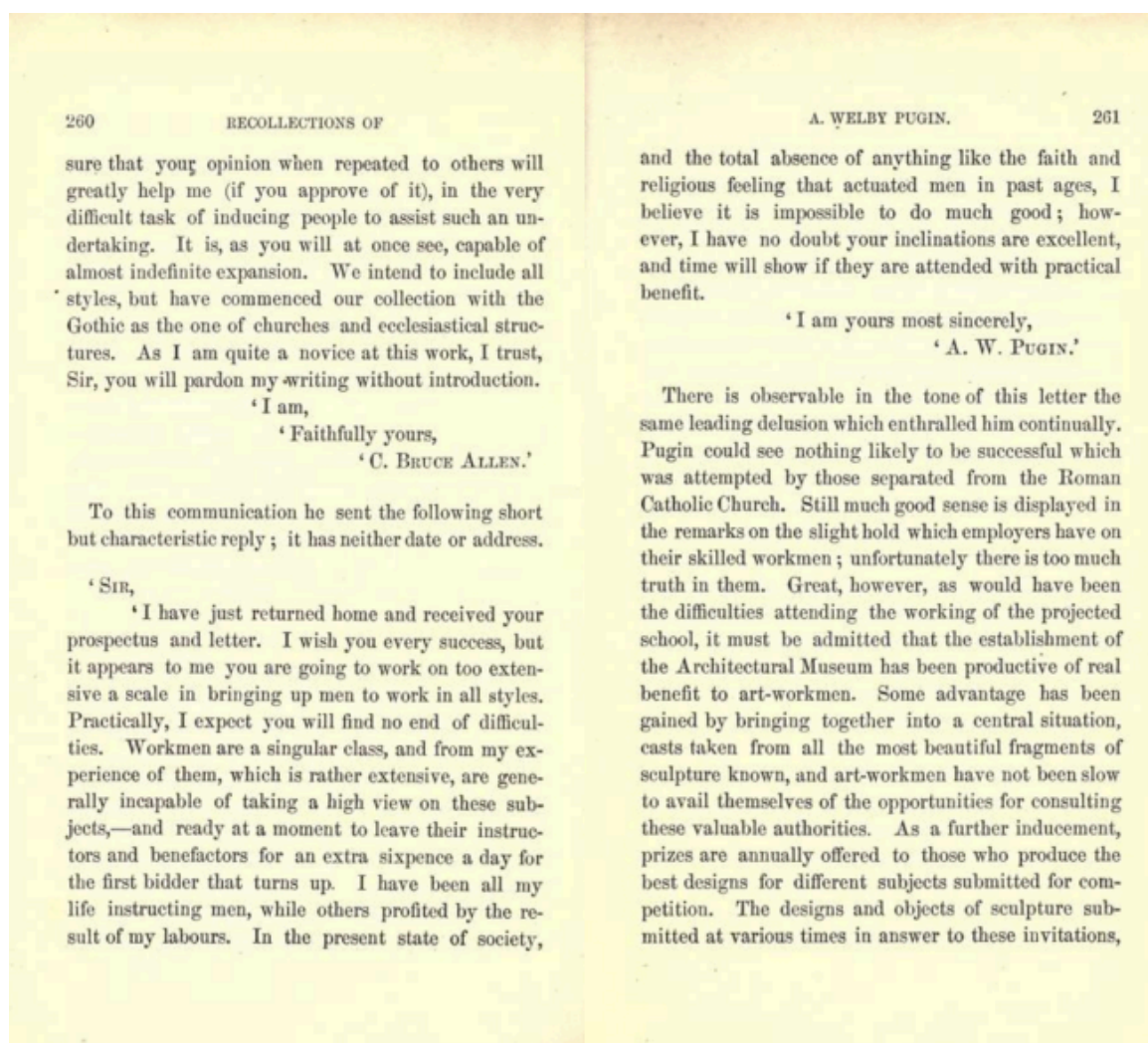
Charles Bruce Allen (c1827-1890), architect

1856 Listed as Allen Charles Bruce, architect, Architectural Museum, Cannon row, Westminster.

1881 Living at 111 Cheyne Walk, Chelsea: Edward E. Allen (age 55 born Camden Town), Civil Engineer. With his wife Isabella R. Allen (age 43 born Tenterden) and their children; Edward C. Allen (age 25 born Greenwich), Clerk; Agnes C. Allen (age 23 born Strand, London), Dressmaker; Florence J. Allen (age 17 born Brompton), Milliner; Arthur H. Allen (age 16 born Brompton); Alice Maud Allen (age 14 born Kensington); and Mabel Grace Allen (age 8 born Chelsea). Also his brother Chas. Bruce Allen (age 58 born Arc Walsers, Sussex), Architect and Unmarried.

1890 Died age 70 in Chelsea district.

MECHANICS' INSTITUTIONS.

A Bill has lately been before Parliament to "Amend the Acts concerning Theatres and Public Houses," by one clause of which it was proposed to extend the meaning of the word "stage plays," as used in the Police Acts, so as

to include under that term a great variety of entertainments, dramatic or otherwise. Such an extended meaning it was thought would (though not intended to do so) interfere with the proceedings of Mechanics' Institutions and other bodies of a similar character, and a letter was addressed by the Secretary of the Society of Arts to Sir G. Lewis, the Secretary of State, by whom the Bill had been brought into the House of Commons, calling his attention to the circumstance, and requesting that such modifications might be introduced as would exclude Institutions from the operation of the Bill. The Bill has since been withdrawn entirely.
